Government Announces Business Growth Service

Businesses across the UK will be able to get quicker and easier help, support and advice, thanks to a new service that will help them grow and thrive. Small businesses consistently say that they find the business support landscape fragmented and complex, with only 26% of UK SME employers reporting in 2023 to have sought external advice or information in the last year.

The Business Growth Service has been designed to address this, offering a UK-wide business support system with a revamped web offer, launching in 2025. It will be developed and will work in partnership with small businesses, local and devolved governments across the UK, with locally led delivery at its core, to ensure the service provides the information and resources smaller firms need from government.

Inspired by successful business support agencies internationally, the Business Growth Service will be an integral part of the Small Business Strategy that will be published in 2025. This will also support the Department of Business and Trade's approach to creating a pro-business environment through the Industrial Strategy and the government's growth mission.

The Government also confirmed £1 billion for the British Business Bank to enhance access to finance for smaller businesses through Start Up Loans; the ENABLE Build; the Growth Guarantee Scheme and Life Sciences Investment Programme.

Government Announces New National Youth Strategy

The Department for Culture, Media and Sport has announced a new National Youth Strategy that aims to break down barriers to opportunities for the country's young people. The new strategy is expected to prioritise delivering better coordinated youth services and policy at a local, regional and national level and hand power back to young people and their communities. Funding plans include:

- £85 million to support more youth facilities, including £26 million for youth clubs to buy new equipment and undertake renovations via the Better Youth Spaces programme
- £100 million from the next tranche of the Dormant Assets scheme will be used to deliver youth outcomes between 2024 and 2028 to support the provision of services, facilities and opportunities for young people across the country. Further details on what the £100 million can support 'will be set out in due course through the publication of the Dormant Assets Strategy'

Funding will also be used to launch a Local Youth Transformation pilot to provide tools, guidance, peer challenge and funding to help local authorities rejuvenate local youth services. In addition, the Creative Careers Programme will be expanded, and will open up new opportunities to access careers in the arts, and continue to invest in multi-sport facilities that provides young people access to quality sports facilities on their doorsteps.

National Lottery Community Fund Commits to £3 billion in 'Life Changing' Funding for England by 2030

The National Lottery Community Fund (NLCF) recently published its 'bold new vision' for supporting communities across England over the next five years which includes distributing at least £3 billion in funds by 2030.

NLCF is currently seeking partners for the development phase of three new approaches which will focus on increasing the voice and resilience of communities that support them:

- <u>Community Power Fund</u> £1.2 million in funding is available for the development stage. Community or voluntary organisations and public sector organisations can apply for grants of between £50,000 and £80,000 per partner organisation
- You Decide Funding £2 million in funding distributed between up to five partners. Community or voluntary organisations can apply for a maximum grant of £80,000 to cover their costs. Of the £2 million, at least £1.6 million is for onward granting to communities
- Grant Holder Support £2.1 million is available to deliver a package of funding and support to address the most common challenges that communities face. This funding will help increase the knowledge, skills and

resilience of civil society organisations. Community or voluntary organisations can apply. One grant of £200,000 for a lead partner and £1.9 million to support around 8 to 10 civil society organisations participating in the partnership and development work.

Expressions of interest for all three programmes will open on 8th January 2025.

Arts and Creative Industries

Arts Council England - National Lottery Projects Grants

Grants are available for individual artists, community and cultural organisations to support arts, museums and libraries projects that engage people in England with arts and culture. Projects can range from directly creating and delivering creative and cultural activity to projects which have a longer term positive impact, such as organisational development, research and development and sector support and development.

The funding is for projects that are focused on one or more of the following disciplines: <u>music</u>, <u>theatre</u>, <u>dance</u>, <u>visual arts</u>, <u>literature</u>, <u>combined arts</u> - <u>including festivals and carnivals</u>, <u>museum practice</u> (<u>accredited or unaccredited</u>) <u>and libraries</u>. Priority is currently being given to the following types of time limited priorities:

- Supporting Grassroots Music specifically supporting rehearsal and recording studios, promoters, festivals, and venues for live and electronic music performance
- Museums Unlocking Collections aimed at enabling museums to develop their collections-based work and increase public engagement with, and use of, their collections
- Universal Library Offers aimed at enabling public libraries with their delivery of the four Universal Library Offers: Reading, Health and Wellbeing, Digital and Information, and Culture and Creativity

Three levels of grants are available:

- Grants of up to and including £30,000
- Grants of between £30,001 and £100,000
- Grants of £100,001 and over

Art Fund - Student Opportunities

Grants of up to £10,000 are available to <u>harness the talent of university students to help realise a project at a museum or gallery</u> in the UK. The programme enables students to explore an interest in the arts alongside future career options, while providing organisations with extra capacity which is skilled and accountable.

Eligible applicants are UK public museums, galleries, historic houses, libraries, archives, agencies and other visual arts organisations that:

- Have a public presence (e.g. a building open to the public) or a public outcome (e.g. a festival or public art programme)
- Can demonstrate that they operate to standards of best practice within the sector (e.g. through Arts Council England accreditation)

They will fund the costs associated with paying students for the time they spend supporting an organisation in delivering projects.

Deadline: 10th January 2025, 9th May 2025, 19th September 2025

BBC Small Indie Fund

Funding is available to <u>small independent production companies across the UK</u> working in TV and film, with a particular focus on diverse-led companies.

In 2023/24 the 57 small companies on the fund included 44 with at least two individuals from underrepresented groups in leadership roles and 38 based outside of London.

The Foundation also helps filmmakers in other ways, such as arranging mentoring, offering advice, and additional funding to ensure that films get seen by the right people once they are completed.

Music for All - Community Project Funding

Grants of up to £2,000 are available to UK-based community groups that aim to bring musical projects to their local communities. The funding is for groups that need assistance to fulfil their potential in developing truly sustainable music programmes.

In the current round, support will be available in the following distinct areas:

- Learning and cognitive challenges
- Groups working with those facing financial hardships
- Working with children in early years age group 0–4
- Physical mobility or accessibility need
- Choral groups

Paul Hamlyn Foundation - Arts Fund

Grants of between £90,000 and £300,000 for activity lasting up to three years, are available to support the core costs of not-for-profit <u>cultural organisations working at the intersection of art and social change</u> within the UK.

This fund is focused on supporting organisations to become more sustainable and to deepen the impact of the work. This can include support for specific posts, skills development, underpinning of the strategy or business model and for project delivery which is central to their organisation's mission and vision.

Consideration will be given to how organisations have been impacted by systemic inequities, such as (but not limited to) racial inequity, socio-economic disadvantage, having disabilities, living in isolated rural communities or experience of the immigration system. Priority will be given to applications which are actively antiracist and intersectional in their approach.

The funding will cover work that involves any of the following: crafts, creative writing (including poetry), dance, design, film, music, opera, photography, digital arts and media, theatre and drama, the visual arts and cross-arts practices.

Business, Economy and Employment

<u>Kent County Council - Kent and Medway Small Business</u> <u>Boost</u>

Interest free loans of between £26,000 and £99,000 over five years are available to businesses in Kent and Medway to help them grow and create new jobs. Applications from the following priority sectors are encouraged:

- Manufacturing
- Pharmaceutical, natural and life sciences

- Green technology
- Digital, media, creative and cultural industries, and tourism
- Food technology manufacturing
- Logistics and construction

Loans can be used for funding land, buildings, plant, software, machinery, equipment, assets acquired from third parties by the transfer of technology or knowledge and wage costs for new employees. Loans must be between 20% to 30% match funded from private sources such as business reserves or bank loans.

BT Group Apprenticeship Fund

The Fund aims to support SMEs, charities, and public sector organisations across England by providing access to £4 million in apprenticeship funding over four years.

The Fund, designed to support up to 550 apprentices, focuses particularly on developing digital skills, aligning with BT's emphasis on technology. As more than a third of mid-sized businesses report difficulty in recruiting apprentices, the funding is expected to have a positive economic impact, estimated at £21 million.

The programme also seeks to promote local economic growth, reduce the digital divide, and enhance social mobility by providing fast access to apprenticeship funding for smaller organisations. Through levy transfers, it aims to help develop local skills and create opportunities for businesses and individuals alike.

<u>Innovate UK - AI Solutions to Develop AI Competencies in Key Sectors Competition</u>

UK registered organisations can apply for grants of up to £100,000 for AI solutions to support AI upskilling in BridgeAI key sectors. This competition aims to develop responsible and ethical AI personalised learning solutions to build AI competencies in key sectors: construction, transport and logistics, creative industries, and agriculture and food processing. The lead organisation must be a UK-registered business of any size and must include at least one SME.

Kent Social Enterprise Loan Fund (KSELF)

KSELF is a social lending programme, aiming to bridge the increasing funding gap for new and existing social enterprises in Kent and Medway, by offering unsecured loans of between £10,000 and £100,000.

The financial package will include an element of up to 30% grant of the loan amount. The aim of the Fund is to spread the culture of social enterprise, break down the barriers which prevent enterprising social businesses from accessing finance and encourage a more enterprising approach to achieving positive change in our communities. Once finance is repaid, it will be re-loaned and re-invested back in the community. The fund is managed by the Kent Community Foundation.

UK Research and Innovation (UKRI)

UKRI is the national funding agency investing in science and research in the UK. UKRI brings together the 7 Research Councils, Innovate UK and Research England. UK-based businesses or research organisations may be able to compete for government-backed funding to:

- Research and develop a process, product or service
- Test innovation ideas
- Collaborate with other organisations

Department for Business and Trade - Start-up Loans

Loans of up to £25,000 are available to entrepreneurs in the UK wishing to start up a new business. The programme is designed to go some way to help solve the problem of supporting people who have a feasible business idea but no access to finance. The programme aims to equip enterprising individuals with the tools needed to make their businesses a success. Successful applicants will receive a low-cost unsecured loan, business mentoring and a range of business products.

To be eligible and apply for the scheme, applicants must be yet to start their business or have been trading for fewer than 36 months.

Home Building Fund

The Home Building Fund is government finance to increase the number of new homes being built in England. Applications are being accepted from private sector businesses (small builders, community builders, custom builders and innovative housing developers and regeneration specialists and businesses) to build new homes or prepare sites for development. It provides two types of finance:

- <u>Development loans</u> (start from £250,000, with house builders typically borrowing between £2 million and £5 million) these are:
 - o For meeting the development costs of building homes for sale or rent
 - To be taken out over five years
- Infrastructure loans (up to £250 million) these are:
 - To prepare the site for the infrastructure needed for housing to progress and land to be prepared
 - o To be taken out over 20 years

Loans can be tailored to individual circumstances and eligible costs will be discussed with each applicant and depend on the type of funding requested.

Homes England wants to encourage innovation, both in the kind of homes that are built and the way they are delivered.

Let's Do Business Loans

Growth loans of between £10,000 and £50,000 are available for businesses who want to grow and are unable to access conventional bank support in areas of the South East and East of England. A business loan over an agreed term up to a maximum of six years with monthly repayments of capital and interest.

Start Up Loans are also available.

Maker Relief Fund - Heritage Crafts Association (HCA)

Grants of up to £1,000 are available to professional craftspeople in the UK who are facing financial hardship. Applicants should fit into one or more of the following categories:

- People on low incomes
- Working class people

- Black and ethnically diverse people, including Gypsy, Roma and Travellers.
- People with disabilities, who identify as neurodiverse, and/or have chronic physical or mental health issues
- Members of the LGBTQIA+ community
- People with caring responsibilities

Grants can be used by the recipient as they wish; there are no restrictions.

Deadline: Applications can be submitted at any time until the end of October 2025.

Queen Elizabeth Scholarship Trust (QEST)

Scholarships and apprenticeship support is available to fund further study, training and practical experience for <u>craftsmen and women across the UK who want to improve their craft and trade skills</u>. QEST helps to fund salaries, training costs and/or materials. Grant amounts as follows:

- Scholarships: up to £18,000, depending on how much funding is required for a project
- Apprenticeships: up to £12,000 (over two to three years, up to a maximum of £6,000 per year)

The application process for a QEST Apprenticeship involves a collaborative effort between an organisation or master and the individual apprentice. It is a joint application that demonstrates the commitment of both parties to the development and growth of the apprentice's craft skills.

Queen Elizabeth Scholarship Trust (QEST) - Emerging Maker Grants

Grants of up to £10,000 are available for the training and education of UK-based <u>early-career craftspeople who wish to develop their skills and expertise</u>. The funding specifically supports training and education programmes to help makers enhance their craft skills and advance their careers. The training can take many forms, from traditional college courses to vocational one-on-one learning with a master craftsperson, or a bespoke programme of short courses.

Samuel Wilson's Loan Trust

Loans are available to <u>young people (aged 18-39)</u> for establishing and developing <u>new businesses</u>, and who are "in need by reason of ill-health, disability, financial hardship or other disadvantage". Low interest loans of up to £50,000 are available. The applicant will have recently set up (or be about to set up) a business, and trade in Greater London, Buckinghamshire, Essex, Hertfordshire, **Kent**, Surrey, East Sussex or West Sussex.

<u>Shanly Foundation – Careers in Construction Grants</u>

Grants of up to £50,000 (or £150,000 over three years) are available for charities and community interest companies working to support people towards <u>employment in construction</u> within selected areas in England, including areas in **Kent** (parts of Sevenoaks, Tonbridge and Malling and Tunbridge Wells). This fund aims to support organisations working to deliver pathways into a career in the construction industry through supporting discrete projects and activities as well as providing unrestricted funding.

Applications are welcome from charities representing the disadvantaged, disabled, long-term unemployed, youth groups, etc. Funding is available for:

• Specific activities with a defined scope of work and project timescale

- Operating/core costs (it is unlikely that the Foundation will fund more than 2% of the organisation's total annual budget)
- Unrestricted funding (cannot be used for endowments or reserves).
- · Capital projects for building works, repairs, or equipment

<u>Skinners' Charity Foundation - Young People's Vocational</u> Deve<u>lopment (Individuals Programme)</u>

Grants of up to £2,000 are available for young people (aged 16 to 26), to take courses (up to level 4) that will help them move into employment. Funding can be given for course fees, equipment/materials, travel costs, childcare and living costs. The funder will consider certain priorities when the fund is experiencing high demand:

- Fewer existing qualifications
- Little or no past working experience
- Lower income households

Skinners Company - Young People's Vocational Development (Charities Programme)

Grants of up to £10,000 are available to charitable organisations supporting NEET young people (not in education, employment or training) primarily in London and Kent, to help them enter the workplace.

Funding is available for specific projects, rather than general organisational costs. Pro-rata staffing and operational costs will be considered where appropriate.

The foundation particularly (but not exclusively) looks to support programmes of work where young people receive a vocational qualification as part of their employment progression. Where immediate employment for young people is not possible, clear progression routes should be evident – such as moving on to further qualifications or through developing clearly employable skills during the project.

Soroptimist International - Diamond Education Grant

Grants (averaging £1,000) are available to women in need of financial support to help them enter or return to employment.

The funding is designed to help women enter or return to work, or transition into growing industries by gaining new skills. It prioritises women in greatest financial need and those facing significant barriers, ensuring the grant has the most meaningful impact. Preference will be given to applications from those aged 30 or over.

Awards are made towards the cost of course fees or books/equipment, not for living expenses. The funding is for one year only. Vocational courses are preferred.

Deadline: 15th April 2025 for grants towards courses in the academic year September 2025 to June 2026

The King's Trust

The aim of the Trust is to provide practical and financial support to young people (ages 16-30) in the UK that are not in work, education or training. The scheme helps develop key skills, confidence and motivation, enabling young people to move into work, education or training. The Trust works with delivery partners across the UK to offer hundreds of free courses, grants and mentoring opportunities to inspire young people to build their confidence and start a career. The Trust focuses its efforts on:

- Young people under-achieving in education
- Young people leaving care
- Young offenders and ex-offenders
- <u>Unemployed young people</u>

Development Award: The King's Trust can cover the cost of course fees, tools or equipment to help young people achieve their goals. The amount of each Award depends on their unique needs, future career goals and personal development plans. Awards are available from £10 right up to a maximum of £500. Development Awards can support:

- Accredited course fees up to Level 3 (A-level equivalent)
- Tools, equipment or uniforms for a job or qualification
- Job licence fees
- Transport to a new job until the first pay slip

Start Up Grant and Start Up Loan: The King's Trust can support young people with a package of Start Up funding that suits their personal circumstances and is right for their business. Up to £30,000 to cover Start Up costs, this could be a combination of:

 Start Up Grant (up to £5,000 however amounts are usually less and vary per person) plus Start Up Loan between £500 to £25,000

Royal Bank of Scotland - Social and Community Capital Loans

Loans of between £30,000 and £500,000 are available to business charities and social enterprises in the UK who do not qualify for mainstream loans. All organisations must be able to demonstrate how they help: people in employment/education; the most disadvantaged; or community regeneration.

A range of costs are supported, such as expansion of networks or supply chains, or help with business and digital skills. There are four loan types:

- Property Purchase Loan: to renovate or purchase a property
- Flexible Growth Funding: to grow and increase the organisation's impact
- Working Capital Loan: to cover overheads and smooth out cashflow
- Bridging Loan: to pay VAT or cover overheads before grant funding starts

Examples of recently funded projects:

- Crisis provides counselling to people in the local community with difficulties such as depression and anxiety. Crisis received funding for a new building to enable them to accommodate more clients
- **Heron Educational Foundation** Heron provide affordable housing for local people and support children and young people in education and beyond

Tycoon Enterprise Competition

A competition designed to encourage <u>entrepreneurial young people</u> from across the UK to start their own business and make a profit whilst they are still in school or further education. It has been set up with the intention of encouraging and inspiring pupils to pitch a business plan to their tutors, in the hope of receiving seed funding.

Business start-up costs can be funded. The maximum start-up loans for participants (participating as an individual or as a team) are as follows:

- Tycoon 750: Primary Schools (Key Stage 1-2) (students 6-11) £750
- Tycoon 1K: Secondary Schools (Key Stage 3-5) (students 11-18) £1,000

If successful in their bid for funding, the students will have one month in which to commence trading and make a profit. At the close of the competition, students will

repay their original loans to the Tycoon Bank, and remaining profits can be used by the school or donated to local charitable causes.

Unloc Young Entrepreneurs Challenge

The overall winner receives a £10,000 grant, a mentorship package and pro-bono support. The winner also attends the One Young World 2025 Global Summit in Munich, Germany.

UnLtd - Awards for Social Entrepreneurs

Funding of up to £18,000 and specialist support is available for <u>UK social</u> entrepreneurs to help them develop as social leaders, and to start up or grow their idea for a social venture.

Energy Redress Scheme

LGBT Financial Recognition Scheme

Financial payments are available for LGBT veterans who served in HM Armed Forces between 27 July 1967 and 11 January 2000 and who have been affected by the Ban on LGBT personnel serving in HM Armed Forces.

The scheme provides two types of payment to recognise the discrimination and the detriment suffered by LGBT personnel under the Ban:

- <u>LGBT Dismissed or Discharged Payment</u>. A payment of £50,000 for veterans who were dismissed or administratively discharged, including officers who were ordered or instructed to resign or retire by their respective Service Board, solely on the basis of their actual or perceived sexual orientation or gender identity during the Ban
- <u>LGBT Impact Payment</u>. Between £1,000 and £20,000. This is for those who were impacted in other ways. This LGBT Impact payment is open to all those who experienced pain and suffering under the Ban, including harassment, intrusive investigations and indeed in some cases imprisonment
